I respectfully encourage President Obama to issue the Posthumous Presidential Pardon of Marcus Garvey. I stand in support of the family of Marcus Garvey, the UNIA International, the Prime Minister of Jamaica, and attorneys Jasmine Rand and Ron Sullivan in their Petition.
